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
Dear Supporter,

It has been another busy month at the AWOL centre as the harvest season continues, the sugar cane crop is coming to an end but there is still a lot of work for the hard-working donkeys on the west bank.

Our mobile clinic is also very busy treating the donkeys out in the villages, catching many of them on their way to or from the fields and the sugar cane railway. The fields of stubble are being burnt ready for the next crop so the donkeys don't get much of a rest.

We have five resident dogs and two donkeys at the centre now. Hopefully, if we can find good homes, we will be able to rehome two of the dogs although the last of the Karnak puppies is still very nervous so we don't feel she is suitable for re-homing just yet. She is currently sharing a kennel with our new resident Toffee who is a lovely friendly girl and they are getting on very well.

Toffee was brought into the AWOL centre by local resident Melinda who contacted us because of threats of poisoning by some other residents. Toffee has previously had a litter of puppies which Melinda helped Toffee raise and then she found new homes for them. Unfortunately not all of Melinda's neighbours like dogs, which is generally the norm in



Luxor, and one particularly unpleasant man had threatened to put down poison - unfortunately this is also not a rare occurrence in Luxor.

Toffee has become much-loved by Melinda and her family; she had been following Melinda to the shops and staying near her house and the thought of her being poisoned was just horrible so she asked AWOL for help. We don't have enough space or funds to be a rescue centre but we had to help so Toffee has moved to the AWOL centre until we can find her a good safe home. She is a lovely girl and we only wish we could keep all the dogs in Luxor safe.



Toffee has settled in very well at the AWOL centre after big hugs by Melinda and her daughter Mimi. She has had a check-up by Dr Mohamed and is at least safe.

Hundreds of dogs are poisoned by government officials as well as disgruntled residents in Egypt. Dogs like Toffee are the lucky ones but hundreds more do not survive the mass poisoning which periodically takes place in most of the governorates in Egypt. It only takes a couple of people to complain about a



dog being 'crazy' or 'mad' and then a mass cull is carried out in the name of preventing the spread of rabies. Unfortunately charities and organisations bigger than AWOL have tried to talk to the government about stopping this practice but with little progress so far. We will persevere though in the hope that one day they will listen. In the meantime we do all we can to help these poor dogs and with the help of local residents we can save some of them.

Melinda and her daughter Mimi came back to the AWOL centre to help groom our resident dogs. Dobby and Tufty are both long-haired and benefitted from a haircut which they enjoyed so much they both fell asleep during the process! Dobby suddenly looks like a puppy again with his new haircut! Many thanks to Melinda and Mimi for helping out with our lovely dogs at the centre.

It's now the season for fresh green Barseem which the donkeys love. Our guards Boghdady and Essa Darwish make frequent trips to the fields we rent so our resident donkeys and some of our patients have a fresh supply of this lovely food. Residents Hector and Zaazooa thoroughly enjoy their fresh food!

The field we rent is just next to the AWOL centre, which you can see in the




background of the photo (left).

Resident donkeys Hector and Zaazooa have their own stables but like to spend some time together. When the centre is closed they can exercise and stroll around the AWOL yard.



This poor little cat was brought into the AWOL centre by local resident Ingrid. Following an injury the cat had been treated by a different vet in Luxor but the heavy bandaging and incorrect treatment had led to gangrene in the cat's leg.

Dr Mohammed removed all the dead and decaying skin from the leg which was a long and delicate procedure.

The cat also needed antibiotic treatment and anti-inflammatory treatment and has so far visited the centre three times for continued treatment. We are very pleased to be able to say that his leg is healing nicely and the little cat, named Tuxedo, is doing very well.

The pink tinge to these photos is due to the red lamp used for the more intricate procedures carried out at the centre as it gives optimum vision.



Every day we see tack injuries - although this bit of old rope barely qualifies as tack. The problems bad tack causes never seem to end but we keep trying to educate the owners and provide the donkeys with treatment and free better tack made by Gergis at the centre.





Out in the villages we see more evidence of the bad tack which causes the injuries to the donkeys. Chains, rope and wire all cause wounds which can become severe if left untreated.



With new tack fitted the donkeys will be more comfortable and injury can be avoided. Every £5 donated to AWOL can provide a new head collar which will improve the quality of these donkeys' lives. £10 can provide a new head collar and a new breaching strap.



Dogs and puppies in the villages also suffer from the use of incorrect and unsuitable materials. Chains and ropes are replaced with new soft collars. The old collars are taken away so they cannot be used on another dog or even re-used on the same dog and the new soft collar sold to make a little money for the owner.



More lovely dogs and puppies in need of soft dog collars both in the villages and at the AWOL centre. As with the donkeys, the chains rope and string often used as dog collars cause wounds and injury. Gergis makes a range of different sized dog collars at the AWOL centre and we also use collars donated by supporters for which we are very grateful. Ahmed fits two beautiful little puppies with new collars at the AWOL centre.



The lovely little dog pictured below was brought into the AWOL centre with an injured front leg. The leg was badly bruised and Dr Mohammed identified a small hairline fracture to the bone. The leg was splinted and securely wrapped by Dr Mohammed and the little dog was also treated with some anti-inflammatory medication. The dog's owner brought him back to the AWOL centre for a check-up and we are very pleased to see that on the second visit he was very much improved and should suffer no long-lasting effects from his injury.



We are very pleased to have a new collecting bin in Arkwrights store in Luxor for any donations of dog food and other items people would like to donate to the AWOL centre. Arkwrights sells a variety of pet supplies as well as imported food goods and is very popular with the expatriate community in Luxor. Many, many thanks to Yasser for generously allowing this in his shop.
